


Presidents Message


WATCH OUT FOR THIS SCAM

Murray Macham reports: A Facebook group chat request was received by a veteran in our Division from 2 senior retired RCMP members about a health and well-being check. He was not surprised as one of the members lives in Chilliwack (as does the veteran) and he had just gotten out of the hospital for surgery and was recovering at home.

They chatted back and forth for a few nondescriptive exchanges. The veteran advised that the member he was talking with had received a 100K grant for home care. He was advised that he should apply and was quite insistent about it. The veteran was suspicious and declined. Smarter than the usual Facebook user he asked a question that only the chat members speaking, and he would know - they both worked at the same place, same time. The member could not answer and instead sent a Facebook link directing him to "Agent Betty Young" for him to click on and get started. The veteran disconnected at that time. He has been unable to reach the two members to alert them that they may have had their Facebook Accounts info cloned.

Beware of receipt of any Facebook chat group conversation looking to check on your wellbeing.

It is a very well executed SCAM.

On May 21st, 2025, a bronze statue (see attachment) will be unveiled on the Princess Royal Walk at the RCMP Heritage Centre in Regina. The beginning of a new brick mural will also be laid on the walkway paying tribute to the 22 RCMP Service Dogs we lost in the Line of Duty over the years. Adjacent to the brick mural, is the dedicated RCMP Service Dog pillar which currently hosts the names of "the Originals", plus the names of 48 RCMP Police Service Dogs on the first full plaque.

The Friends of the RCMP Heritage Centre are actively working on the 2nd plaque of 48 names, to be placed in time for the unveiling of the statue. The RCMPVA Foundation and two RCMP Veterans have donated in excess of \$100,000 to make the Princess Royal Walk the official home of our service dogs and those on our Honour Roll. This is significant to us as Handlers and more importantly it provides a platform to memorialize our four-legged partners that work so hard on behalf of Canadians.

HISTORICAL CORNER

Lord Strathcona Horse by Ric Hall


As a result of some failings by the British Army during the Boer War (1899 to 1901) the RCMP were asked to supply mounted personal to help respond to the guerrilla type warfare of the



enemy. The Boers were white native South Africans of Dutch descent who

were fighting to establish their own free state, separate from the British Colony of South Africa. Such a regiment was formed as a unit of the Imperial Army militia and was named the Lord Strathcona Horse (LdSH). For various reasons a pennant (a triangular shaped flag) of the LdSH ended up in the possession of the Commissioner of the RCMP and subsequently at

NEVER ENDING STORY by Ric Hall.

I rec'd this video clip, hope you can open it, not sure if the guy in uniform is a security guy or a copper. He sure did not take any (argument) from the big guy. Notice the knee to neck at the end of the scuffle! Reminder of the George Floyd thing. We all have stories from our past, but this video struck a chord of an incident in my memory bank.

We have all been involved with scuffles with drunks in our early years. This video took me back in time. Circa 1970 Peace River Town Detail, driving by the Victory Hotel, see this big Indigenous guy, obviously drunk. I pull over and walk up to him and grab him by the arm. In most cases the drunk would usually come along and get in the back seat of the p.c. Not this time. The fight, I mean a real fight, was on. We ended up against the plate

glass window of the Marshall Wells store next to the Victory Hotel, it was wobbling, I thought we were going to go through it. I finally got the guy over to my p.c. and had him straddled over the trunk. I was exhausted, my ear had been cut and was bleeding. I have suffered from asthma most of my life and the exertion of this fight was causing me trouble breathing while restraining this guy over the trunk of my car. Wearing a brown tunic and full Sam Browne certainly did not help. Many years later I found out there is such a thing as exercise induced asthma. Along came a AGT truck full of workers and they stopped and asked if I needed help. I said no, I was determined to get this prisoner in the back seat of my p.c. I eventually did. I often thought those AGT guys just wanted to get into a bit of a fracas. Turns out this guy I was dealing with had just been released from the Peace River Correctional Institute after serving two years less a day. First stop upon release was the Victory Hotel. Flashback two years on Christmas morning, I was on Peace River Hwy. Patrol and filling in time sitting in the detachment office chatting with the duty constable, having nothing else to do. Not really feeling the need to be out issuing speeding tickets. The phone rang and it was the AGT operator saying she had a man on the phone who said he had a "kid" in custody in his house. The kid was the same guy I had a fight with. He had walked up and down the main street of Peace River, Christmas eve, breaking into businesses and finding liquor to drink. He hit the local sports shop early Christmas morning found a rifle and more booze. The owner arrived to pick-up Christmas gifts he had stored in the shop and was taken hostage (in those days we did not talk of hostages) by the young kid. He took the man to his house and after a bit the man and his son tackled him and called AGT who in turn called the police. So much for a quiet Christmas morning. The kid was arrested, went to court, right away, pled

guilty, sentenced to two years less a day. He spent a lot of time lifting weights and became a man. This is the same guy I confronted upon his release from gaol. He pled guilty to assaulting a police officer and went right back to the Correctional Institute. The Judge in sentencing him said he was lucky I didn't shoot him! His trail of break-ins was very clear later Christmas morning. The question was asked where was the Town Detail member who was supposed to be working the night shift. Apparently he took the night off and went home. A few days later he was gone from the Force.

The never-ending story continues: some 53 years later I got an e-mail at home from one of those AGT guys asking if I was Ric Hall who was stationed in Peace River and had a fight in front of the Victory Hotel. He mentioned me having the prisoner straddled over the trunk of the police car and he and his work mates thought they could help. He remembered me saying I was fine (I was not). With a last great effort, I got the guy into the back seat. This former AGT guy was sending his message from the far east, like Asia, he saw my name attached to one of my stories for the Vets. Small world!!

Larry Burden (#35982), who served in "E" Division for 20 years, has spent many years researching and summarizing these achievements by specific date. Much as I would like to vent against the American President especially his desire to see the organization we all once worked for and cherish, handed over to the FBI, I will instead bring you where Mr. Trump has not threatened to turn into the 51st state; many would say it has taken on so much Americanism few would notice the difference; I refer of course to my country of birth, The United Kingdom.

WOMEN OFFICERS

PROFITING FROM POLICE KILLING.



Continuing on from our last two issues and the tributes paid to our women officers; during my UK service in 1984 a UK woman uniformed officer, Yvonne Fletcher, (see photo and memorial stone on left) was shot dead in London (England) while on duty outside the Libyan Embassy. Libyan exiles in London were protesting against GHADAFI's Libyan Regime. (Colonel Mohammar Ghaddafi, the Libyan President at the time) Constable Yvonne FLETCHER was part of a Metropolitan Police of London England ("The Met") contingent supervising a peaceful demonstration outside the Libyan Mission when someone inside the Embassy decided to fire shots into the crowd and Yvonne was hit and later died from her wounds. She was 25 yrs old. The police in UK, then as now, are unarmed routinely. Embassy duty usually attracts officers who stand outside Embassies in uniform who are armed, but Yvonne was not part of that group because of the demonstration. The nonarmed status of the British police is well known amongst all foreign diplomats in London. Despite the Met Polices remarkable record of tracking down and securing the arrest and conviction of foreigners engaged in such acts on British soil, no one was ever brought to book for this outrage. The Met had to accept the claim by Libyan Government, supported by Margaret Thatcher, the then British Prime

Minister, that the perpetrator was protected by the "Diplomatic Immunity" protocol which all foreign delegations enjoy worldwide.


LATEST DEVELOPMENTS

A new investigation is now underway, and The Met have arrested two men connected with the shooting. The investigation has publicly released photographs of some other persons they wish to interview in the shooting. (see You Tube footage from below mentioned link)

In December 2024, 44 yrs after Yvonne Fletchers death it was revealed that a charity fund set up in PC Fletchers name as part of a Justice Campaign in the UK. It was discovered in 2024 that this fund was a fraud (and no doubt to launder cash therefrom) and none of the monies went to the supposed charity. An individual was arrested in July 2024 and is still under investigation. The funds involved are quite substantial. However, the Police Force investigating is NOT the Met. Only time will tell if this has sinister connotations.

The Yvonne Fletcher case has been one of controversy and a retired police officer (who served in the Met) in UK has done extensive research and produced a book on the topic.

(see Inset) I haven't read it yet but here are the details for anyone who is interested. I also include some related links for further reading. As we all know the RCMP have officers stationed in London in various roles including the Canadian High




Commission as Liaison Officers (LO's) and some of its consulates.

Ill share with you some new and sad news from my previous life as a cop in England.



Obituary - Robert Eric (Bob) TAYLOR, Detective Chief Superintendent, West Yorkshire Police, Born July 17th, 1949, died 28th December 2024 of lung cancer. Years of service 1970 to 2001.

I attended Bob's online

funeral on January 16th of this former friend and colleague in the UK Police. Bob and I were from the same City and District of Leeds, and he was best man when Carol and I married in 1972. He had little or no connection with Canada, but he did make a remarkable impression on British policing and had an outstanding career. Many of his cases will be familiar to Canadians of UK descent or who have a particular interest. On his death his Obituary occupied a full page of

two of Uk's foremost daily newspapers, Daily Telegraph and The Times. Bob joined the Leeds Police in 1970 and was posted to my detachment. He and I grew up in the same



neighborhood and we soon became friends, often socializing together and his wife at the time Maggie. We shared a keen interest in investigational work and within a few years we transferred to the Detective office and went our separate ways. We both worked on the

Yorkshire Ripper Murders² as low-ranking Detectives (not remarkable as most policemen in Leeds and the surrounding area worked that case at one time or another. Because of the poor performance of the senior ranks in catching the Ripper, being a senior detective in that investigation wasn't something to be particularly proud of. Bob and I were posted to the Regional Crime Squad which is the closet you could get in those days to integrated units of police forces. I came to Canada in 1980, but Bob stayed and followed his calling. He did remarkably well as the attached links of his obituaries will point out. He became the murder specialist and claimed 100 per cent detection record which was never disputed. Some of his cases will be familiar to ex British officers amongst our ranks. le The Michael Sams case in which two women were separately kidnapped for ransom. One victim was murdered the other found tied up in a garbage can but just alive when found. The other was a vicious thug labelled the "Foot Fetish Rapist" who broke into a woman's house raped and killed her and dumped the body. Bob eventually became the head of Britain's National Crime Squad which later became Britain's National Crime Agency. Bob retired in 2001 after 30 yrs service, and he published his book shown above. I met him twice during my trips to England over the years and can say he never changed from the young Constable and Detective I knew. Down to earth, approachable and lots of common sense and good humour as the link to the attached video shows. He left 5 children, one of whom is a Sergeant in the London Metropolitan Police and his wife Sheron Boyle.. Links.
